

# Ecological Tiny Home Community: A small solution for a huge social-economic issue



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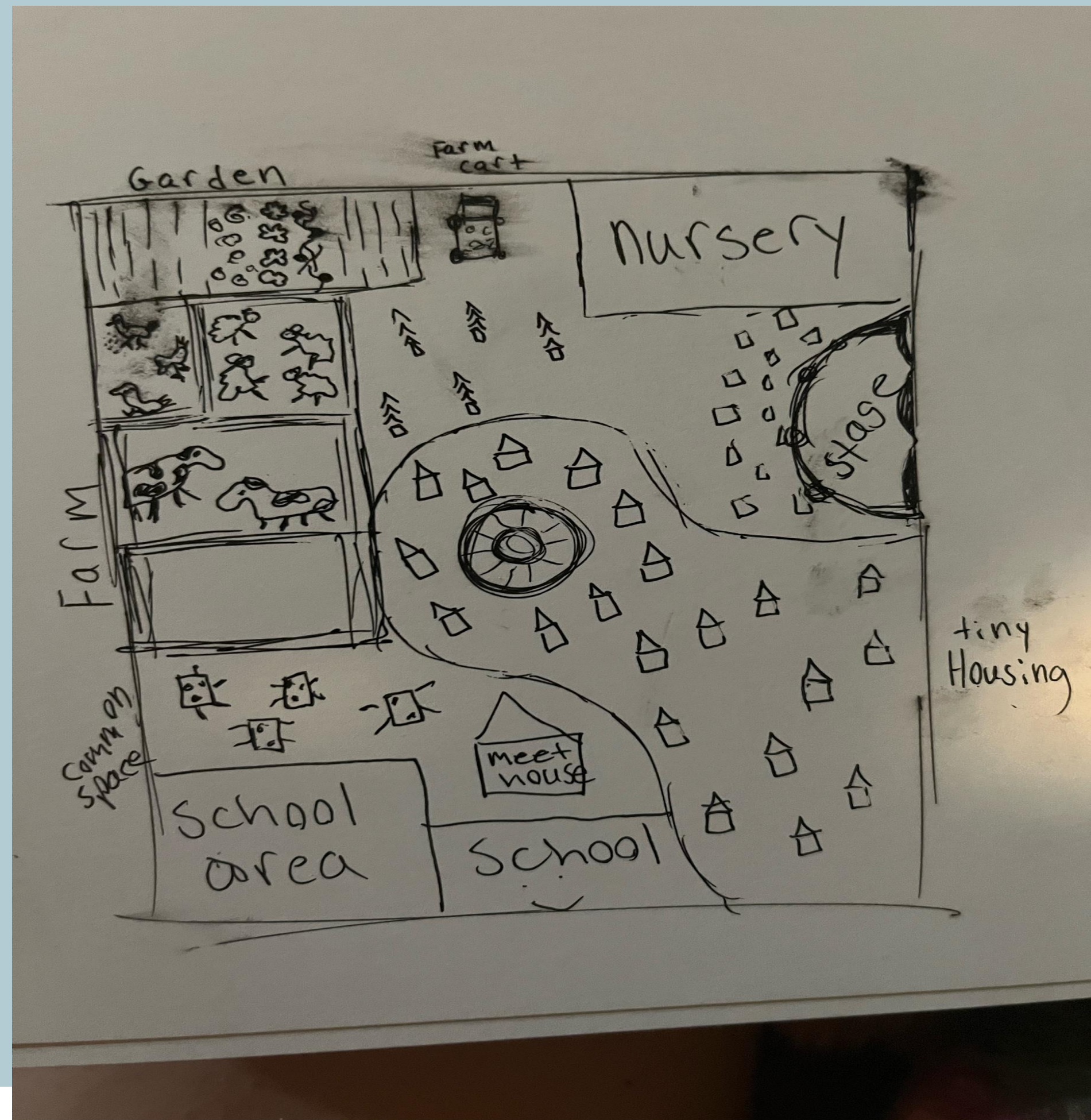
