



Background

Sudden Sensorineural Hearing Loss (SSNHL) is a rare but urgent condition that causes by rapid hearing loss, usually in one ear, which can take a few hours or even days. SSNHL is known as an idiopathic condition, meaning its exact cause is often unknown. But it is sometimes linked to factors like viral infections, autoimmune disorders, or circulatory issues. For individuals affected by SSNHL, immediate treatment is essential, due to the fact that early intervention significantly improves the likelihood of hearing recovery (National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders [NIDCD], 2023). According to the NIDCD, taking corticosteroids within the first 14 days of getting SSNHL is a common treatment that usually has positive outcomes for many patients. However, due to the lack of public awareness, people most likely will delay seeking treatment, leading to a higher risk of permanent hearing loss.

Future Research

I hope as the continued research about SSNHL reveals more about the mostly random issue I can continue to learn about and spread the knowledge. I plan to expand the awareness program with things like social media posts or a whole page dedicated to spreading awareness. By doing this I could reach an audience much larger than innovation academy and continue closing the gap in education about SSNHL.
